
RUMRIVER ART CENTER STAFF & TEACHING ARTISTS

Chris Singewald, Ceramics Director



From 2011–2013, Singewald was a Resident Artist and Materials/Glaze Technician at Northern Clay Center in Minneapolis, MN, as well as the Outreach and Studio Technician. He was the Outreach Manager at Northern Clay Center from April 2013 to January 2017. In March 2019, Chris curated Variations of Shino, an exhibition featuring 20 regional potters utilizing Shino glaze during the National Council on Education for the Ceramics Education (NCECA) conference in Minneapolis. He was awarded the 2019 Fogelberg Studio Fellowship at Northern Clay Center. Chris traveled to Haystack Mountain School of Craft in 2018, 2019, and 2022 participating as a workshop assistant, technician, and a Ceramics instructor for their Student Craft Institute. Emily Comstock, Teaching Artist

Comstock is a sculptor who has worked and taught in many pockets of clay history including the Archie Bray Foundation, Penland School of Craft, and Northern Clay Center. Although his main media is acrylic on canvas, he has also used charcoal, pencil, pen and ink, mixed media, watercolor and oils. He loves to experiment and try new things, but most of his work is predominantly realism or representational. He tends to focus on nature, landscapes, some wildlife, some architecture and florals. He enjoys sharing the beauty of the natural world in his work, loves bright, vivid colors, sunsets and imagery depicting strength and power. One of his hobbies is metal detecting, which he began doing around 2013 and which fueled his love of coins. After purchasing the necessary equipment, he began to practice the process of coin ring making and within a few months, began to feel more confident in the craft. 


Mary Horgan, Teaching Artist




Erin Proctor, Teaching Artist

Collecting and responding with a new narrative, she loves building surfaces with grit and layers by adding and then redacting. She primarily works analog to use her human touch to create the work. The scale varies from small index card size to 5 feet wide. She explores the dissonant through the co-existence of patterns and images that do not typically belong together as a way of pursuing and creating harmony. She has a Masters of Art Education from University of Minnesota. She has been teaching art in the Anoka-Hennepin School District for the last 17 years and at RRAC the last 2 years. She has taught mostly Wheel and Hand-Building classes at RRAC but loves working with all mediums.
